NOT A NORMAL SUNDAY

There are a lot of ways that Sundays in Southwest Alaska are out of the ordinary in comparison to a Sunday in the "Lower 48". For instance, in Naknek and the surrounding area, the best way to get around is by small aircraft. Every Sunday, weather permitting, we fly across the river to South Naknek and also 40 miles to the northwest to the village of Ekwok to hold Sunday Services.

Last Sunday was a little more out of the ordinary. This time we planned on delivering a new puppy to Ekwok with us as we headed up there for church. We got our Piper Cherokee Six ready to go.

Flight preparation takes a little longer during the winter, requiring advanced planning. The night before, I put on the engine blanket and plug in the aircraft so it's sufficiently preheated for an easy start.

That Sunday, we accomplished the preflight inspection, removed the engine blanket, and my first load of passengers and I were sitting in the airplane. Pastor Jeff Swanson came to the plane and said that one of the parishioners in South Naknek was very sick and was requesting to go to the hospital in Dillingham. Fortunately earlier in the morning, I had checked the weather for Dillingham and knew that it was supposed to be good all day.

I flew those who were going to do the service in South Naknek there, and left word that I would be back at the South Naknek airport to pick up the sick passenger in 15-20 minutes. I flew back across the river, to Naknek, fueled up for the Dillingham flight, picked up Pastor Jeff and another passenger, and hopped back across the river. There we picked up the passenger who wasn't feeling well.

We flew directly to Dillingham, where a person was waiting at the airport to take our sick passenger to the hospital. Then, we took off for Ekwok. Unfortunately, we had to cancel the church service in Ekwok earlier in the day when we had got word of the need-

ed medical trip to Dillingham. The short winter days won't accommodate a longer stop in Ekwok with the "surprise" of added trip Dillingham. But still, we could stop in for a short while.

The puppy was riding along with us this whole time, and seemed to enjoy the flight, sleeping most of the way. Once in Ekwok, we delivered the puppy, some quilts, and some children's books and Bibles to the folks there. Then we headed home.

The airplane is a tool that God uses to spread His Word and His love to people. These out of the ordinary ministry opportunities prove that. We continue to be grateful for the Lord's provision and safety for flying. We appreciate all you who support us as we bring the Good News of the Savior to Southwest Alaska!

AFLC MEMBERS SERVING CHRIST IN THE NAKNEK AREA

This past summer I was part of a group of 12 believers from Prince of Peace Lutheran in Beulah, ND that was privileged to spend 10 days in Naknek, helping at The Net, and working on various maintenance and construction projects.

There are two things that stand out to me the most from the trip.

1) God has assembled a faithful, dedicated, and fruitful team with the three AFLC missionary families that serve Naknek and the surrounding area. They gave Godly love, and physical help if needed, to all they came in to con-

tact with...including those of us from Beulah. We saw direct evidence of many lives touched by Christ.

2) The airplane is a vital ingredient for ministry in this part of Alaska. There are no roads out of Naknek to the smaller villages that we serve with Pastoral and lay member visits, and VBS teams.

In the short time I was in Naknek, I made 13 flights to South Naknek, ten were work project related, and three to attend Bible study or worship services. I was also able to help fly the VBS team to and from Igiugig and also up to Kokhanok. My wife Margie and I, along with Pastor Swanson and another Beulah team member, flew the FLAPS 175 to Sunday afternoon worship at Ekwok. It is beautiful and remote country to fly over. We were able to see moose and bear on several occasions.

The summer months see the most airplane use with many trips hauling kids to Bible

Camp, and occasional flights to Anchorage for medical visits and supplies.

There were many flights this summer for the four young people who served on the 2016 VBS team: Kyle, Marli, Heather, and Amelia. They were flown out on Monday mornings to one of the six outlying villages of Ekwok, Egegik, Igiugig, Kaligonik, Kokhanok, and South Naknek. After their week of sharing with and loving on the children, the team would be picked up Friday and flown back to Naknek for the weekend. There they would gather new supplies to prepare for the next week and participate in Sunday worship. The VBS team was a huge blessing to the children who attended, and their families, and it wouldn't be possible without the use of the FLAPS airplanes.

As it reads in Romans 10:14,15 "And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them? And how can they preach unless they are sent?"

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

I returned to Alaska in November to complete the "unfinished business" of June 22. The first project when arriving at KAKN on Friday, November 12th was to construct/paint a wooden cabinet or rack. A refurbished Robert A. Jones FM translator had a good flight from our home in Fergus Falls, MN and was bench tested in the KAKN transmitter room.

On Monday, November 21st we lifted off in the FLAPS Cherokee 6 at Naknek Airport. The day was beautiful and working conditions at Ma-

nokotak were even better. All the equipment was installed and in order of signal/data flow: NanoStation, Linksys Router, Bridge-IT CODEC and finally the new Robert A. Jones FM Translator (an existing VersaCount FM translator is forecast to be installed by Jeremy Crowell and Jeff Swanson the week of December 5th depending on good flying weather).

A CODEC at KAKN delivers the FM audio over the internet to the Manokotak CODEC. This portion was having some configuration issues and is the most complex of the tasks. Recorded music is currently being broadcast at Manokotak as the CODEC connection needs some final configuration.

The Manokotak upgrade is the first of more FM translator projects. Two more for sure (Igiugig and Koliganek)

and possibly another two are being studied. The forecast is once FCC Form 349 is Construction Permit is approved, then Koliganek will be quickly installed. The goal is to align KAKN coverage with villages in which we hold Vacation Bible School [VBS] each summer. Small FM scanning radios will be provided in Summer 2017 to the VBS students.

Prayer is the first step; then some planning, engineering, budgeting, site approvals

to co-locate our equipment with a host and FCC approval. The new FM Translator are "possible" translator sites since they are "white space" (served by less than two other FM stations). And, of course, financial support is needed to purchase equipment. Prayer is where this all starts and ends.
